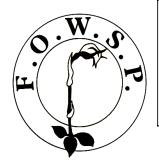

Year in Review presented by Gray

Firstly we thank Parks Victoria for allowing us to play a part in making Warrandyte State Park [and the Warrandyte-Kinglake Conservation Link] the priceless asset that means so much to all of us. We thank Faye Williams, our Area Chief Ranger, and closer to home, Warren Murphy, the Warrandyte Team Leader. Without the click and collect sales, we would certainly have found ourselves in a worrying financial position - not to mention the outright waste of thousands of valuable plants. A third value has been the joy and purpose that these plants have given our members and customers during the bleak days of lockdown.

We also thank Warren's hard-working team of Rangers, especially Phil Rance, Cam Beardsell, and the invaluable Col Bromiley. We particularly thank Phil, our Contact Ranger, who always makes time for us, even though he clearly already has more than enough to do.

This is going to be a short report – firstly because it is only eight months since the last AGM, and secondly because our activities have been severely curtailed by a certain virus; but while I'm expressing the Committee's thanks, I turn our attention to our staff.



I'm going to get into trouble for saying complimentary things about our excessively modest Nursery Manager, but here goes:

Countless thankless tasks fall to the obliging and uncomplaining Josh: Who but Josh keeps track of the life cycle of the hundreds of species of plants we propagate? Who but Josh is able to predict the precise moment to harvest the seeds of all those species and get out there to collect them?

All our volunteers and customers receive Josh's full and courteous attention - it is a rare quality to combine knowledge with patience and the ability to communicate well.

Our Nursery Assistant, Michelle, is currently working from home, but we can't wait to have her back at the Nursery. She is quite incredibly organised, efficient, dedicated and knowledgeable – and I can tell you, from having worked with her for over a year: a delightfully warm and generous colleague.

In past years I've thanked members of the Committee for their various valuable contributions, but as I thought about it, I suddenly realised that since this report is on behalf of the Committee, there's something rather silly about the Committee thanking itself - especially as you will already be aware of all that each of its members contributes.

Thanking people is in itself a thankless task because one is bound to neglect to give all the thanks that are due – however I can assure you that we are very grateful for all the help we've had this year. We couldn't have had such a successful year without every single one of your contributions.

Nursery Report read by Gray

Josh wants to thank all who volunteered this year and cooperated with the rostering system which worked well.

The 'click and collect' sales during times of restrictions was also very successful - it may continue in a lesser form next year.

Melbourne water capital works have placed several large plant orders for next year.

This year the nursery successfully grew 38 extremely rare *Glycine latrobiana* for the recovery project. We have a new roof over the orchids which is enabling more control of watering these special plants

Thanks to the builders, repairers, waterers and everyone else who quietly contributed over the year. Josh wants to reinforce the thanks already expressed to Phil for 'Tagging' and Michelle and Gray for keeping 'click and collect going' and Col for keeping the pump going as well as others who have contributed quietly in many ways.

Rangers' report presented by Phil

Phil's informative report reminded us of what a busy year the rangers have had under the challenges of Covid 19. This included increased visitation generally and locally Mt Lofty, Pound Bend and Jumping Creek, and more remote sites. Although some problems were seen with dogs in no dog areas and additional illegal mountain bike tracks, most of the visitors were well behaved.

Severe storm damage has also required hours of clean up work and seems to be becoming an increasingly frequent event.

Pest plant programs included the Peri-urban Weed Management initiative, Good Neighbours Programs, blackberry control and others as well as the in-house weed program.

Pest animal programs included control of rabbits (annual), foxes and deer. Equally important is the continuation of biodiversity fence construction all protecting incredibly rare plants and veg types including many listed plants. Three of the fences are 1 ha in size.

Environmental /threatened species programs included Nillimbik Council's forest health monitoring program which aims to record the extent of the white-throated nightjars, Melbourne Water funded southern toadlet research program as well as other in-house monitoring.

Exciting results are being seen with the orchid recovery program.

Notably *Caladenia oenochila* the wine-lipped spider orchid post-burn at Dodds St, St Andrews, where there have been large increases in population with 350 flowering plants. This is the world's largest population of this orchid. Pollination, natural and by hand, has resulted in success for roughly 200 plants.

Caladenia rosella is also increasing in numbers thanks to efforts and protection in two locations. These are mov-

ing toward the goal of achieving a genetically healthy and self-sustaining population. This requires at least – 200 individuals at a single site.

Cam's 20 year review of the flora of Warrandyte – work started by Cathy Willis, Pat Coupar and David Van Bockel and ultimately a long-term collaboration - is in progress. A critically endangered short list is cur-

rently being reviewed by Cam, myself and Josh. This will guide what management actions we can put into place such as collecting seed, cuttings or individual plants and building fences.

FOWSP-related grants included Fourth Hill Betton Track where FOWSP has assisted with weed control and enrichment planting and fences to protect *Olearia* & *Craspedia* species at Fourth Hill.

Planned burning has been carried out at Fiddler Gully and Pindari and is scheduled as ecological burns in newly fenced areas.

Volunteers

It was a hard year for all. However, we still managed seven ranger-led TAGs and numerous autonomous TAGS in a very interrupted year. Once again, the main focus was on high conservation value work and sites, a lot of which FOWSP have historically been involved in. Also focused on locally rare species being planted or protected.

In closing, I'd like to say thanks both personally and on behalf of PV for:

- Approximately 1500 hours contributed
- Several hundred FOWSP-grown plants installed in the park some locally rare and threatened
- Joint managing projects in the park
- Applying for grants
- Invaluable community engagement and representation.

At present volunteers at the nursery are as rostered only.



Volunteers return to Frogland

Nothing has given me more pleasure recently than getting back into Frogland for some serious work.

Marie, new volunteer Christine and myself have found that although the overall appearance of Frogland is good and many of our indigenous plants are thriving, the weeds have also relished the wetter spring weather. Major weeds we are currently attacking are sweet vernal and vulpia

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grasses and plantain. The fact that the soil has remained moist has meant we have also been able to carry out some late spring planting. This has included Craspedia variabilis (photo left) and *Pimelea humilis* (in Linda's hand at right). It was pleasing to find the some previously planted *Craspedia* was still in bloom.

This area, near Beckett Road, was planted some years ago by the TAG, but it has suffered from significant weed growth and our inability to give it sufficient attention, especially over the past two years.

A very small group selected a manageable area and made great progress, revealing a high success rate with the *Acacia genistifolia, Lomandra, Goodenia, Themeda* sp. and others previously planted.

Naughton Avenue is another area that has suffered from 2 years of lack of attention. This area includes the upper slope towards the river 'cliffs'.

Some very large Pittosporum had taken hold, which were attacked with gusto by the group - Judith, Robyn, David, Brian and Don, as well as lilies, thistles, and some of the more isolated patches of rampant succulents.

Catching up with Murnong

Until recently I had thought that Murnong equaled *Microseris lanceolata*. Recently I have had my yam daisy ID corrected to *Microseris walteri*. I decided to look into this further. A friend pointed out that a useful tool for identifying *M. walteri*, which is the 'tasty' one, is by looking at a single dried seed head (shown in photo below). For *M. walteri* it is noticeably wider at the base. Neville Walsh has helpfully made up a table to point out other differences between the three species in Victoria.

I still wonder whether or not all three species were called Murnong or only the palatable one? It

appears likely from his article that this was the case .

If your eyes are sharp you will see a tiny greenish native bee in the Murnong flower on the left. I think this is a *Homalictus* sp.

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Diuris punctata group

Once purple Diuris were seen in their thousands across the western plains of Victoria and elsewhere in the state.

These were photographed in a small remnant area on private land west of the Grampians on 9 November 2021 during a most welcome outing with the Orchid Society terrestrial interest group. See other photos from this trip on the next page.

The Christmas collage on the final page is composed of *Prostanthera lasianthos* the Victorian Christmas bush, which is blooming on cue in my garden. It is crowned by the bright underside of *Austracantha minax* the Christmas jewel spider. This intriguing spider, which is much smaller than the collage indicates, is very commonly seen in the bush this time of year. The decorations are contributed by some of our colourful leaf beetles, *Paropsisterna octolineata* with red and black stripes and the green *Paropsides calypso* the lillypilly beetle.
