

# Propagation Work Groups

We meet 10am. at the depot, and so far we have learned at least enough to know the importance and rewards of propagating the locals. So far we have learnt the where's and hows of what not to do!— Practical info on which soil mixes are which, and how to scrub up. Lots of 'potting on' and 'pricking out' of seedlings has made a large impression on the shade house. Kim is able to inspire us to great heights, and her nursery experience is invaluable. A very keen group went by bumpy 4WD to search for Casuarina Littoralis, but without success. However Kim had us identifying so many Indidydytes our brains were dancing with visions of gumnuts! We eventually found some seed with a little help from our intrepid leader, and there will be a sowing of these later this month.



### Seed development

Described simply, trees reproduce either by flowers, for example eucalypts and wattles, or by cones, for example cypresses and pines. Many types of flowers and cones are found, and a particular type may characterise a species, a genus or even an entire plant family.



Many wattles produce large quantities of seeds which are easy to collect. Shown here are pods and seeds of the black wattle (Acacia melanoxylon).



eucalypts produce and scatter seeds.

- (a) Very young cluster of flower buds
- (b) Cluster of developing flower buds
- (c) Flowers, creamy white
- (d) Fruits, commonly called gumnuts, containing ripe seeds
- (e) Dry fruit scattering seeds; empty fruits often remain on the tree for some time.

Shrub: Up to 3m

Flowers: Yellow, pea like, Winter — Spring.

**Fruit:** Dark brown, silky pod with 5-8 seeds.

Also a heavy seeder, **cape broom** is an aggressive invader of higher rainfall areas. It is particularly bad around Seville and Mt. Dandenong where it is common on creek banks and roadsides. Its seeds are spread by vehicles, stock or on clothing. Like many other weeds this perennial occurs also on neglected agricultural land. It often has a weeping habit.

#### Mechanical control

Isolated clumps and seedlings should be gently pulled out and then burnt. Larger bushes should be cut and their stumps poisoned.

**Cape broom** is relatively easy to eradicate on farms, where it can be slashed and the ground 'ripped'. Make sure you don't confuse this weed with the native **golden tip** (Goodia lotifolia) or with some of our other native peas.

Chemical control alternatives are available.

The annual membership of F.O.W.S.P. for 1989 has been set at \$10.00 per family. The small increase is unavoidable due to rising costs.




