Editorial

The development of community life in this country was greatly affected by worldwide depression in the 1930's, that was followed by six years of war when there was rationing of food and clothing and a shortage of manpower and materials. In the early post war period jobs became plentiful and education was freely available to all. Many young men took advantage of deferred pay to buy land and build houses. The severe shortage of basic building materials and rising land prices led some to purchase cheaper land in the outer areas of Melbourne. In Eltham, \$40 an acre was not uncommon. Small groups of adventurous souls moved into the area that was sparsely inhabited by writers, artists, and sculptors. It was not an easy transition from the city where water, electricity, and sewage were taken for granted. General transport were primitive by today's standards and roads were often just tracks through the bush. Mud brick buildings did become popular to overcome material shortages and avoid transport problems. All these hardships had one positive effect. It drew people together, and they lived from a more cooperative base, where neighbours helped each other and they become more conscious of their relationship to the environment. They built their homes with minimal disturbance to the surroundings. There is no doubt that without such a sense of community many would have failed and returned to the security of city life.

Two generations later we are in danger of becoming just another slice of suburbia. People are tending to become more 'self serving' as opposed to 'other serving'. This places a heavy burden on those who give so much to the community. Environmental groups, local councillors, and church workers are amongst those who set a fine example to all of us. The apparent dilemma between self and other is one for personal decision, but ultimately can be seen as a matter of balance. Setting it too far in one direction may have disasterous results. One thing is certain—those that involve themselves in some 'other serving' do seem to live a more satisfying and fulfilling life. If we fail to strike the right balance then we risk the loss of such unique places as Warrandyte.

Despite howling gales, torrential downpours and squelchy mud, a foolhardy flock of FOWSPS have attended the thursday propagating sessions this winter. In fact the efficient band of workers, have been so productive, that the polyhouses and shadehouse have filled up rapidly with new plants. This follows the successful planting of thousands of last years stock by school children, rangers and C&M's.

As a result, the thursday group has decided to diverse into other areas. An experimental direct seedling project is underway on the old orchard site. A selected area was marked out and prepared before being sown with a variety of indigenous seeds. We have already noticed that some of the eucalyptus seeds are germinating. This is an encouraging sign only three weeks after sowing and at the coldest time of the year. It will be an ongoing project observed carefully over the next few months and indeed years.

Recently, we noticed that our stocks of some eucalyptus seed were very low. A few native plants retain seed all year, fortunately the eucalypt is one of these. So a concentrated effort, aided by a long-handled pruner and some fallen branches resulted in a good yield of seed over the last few weeks.

Finally, the thurday group is now undertaking specific weeding tasks, targeting small areas where eradication may be achieved. A couple of weeks ago, we hand pulled Spanish Heath (Erica lusitanica) in an isolated area of The Common. The plants were in full flower and certainly from a distance resembled indigenous Common Heath (Epacris impressa).

Last thursday, a day of viscious wind and rain squalls, we drove along Webb St to the southern most end of Timber Reserve. Here, we left the comfort of our cars to enter the bush. We removed a large number of Sweet Pittosporum (Pittosporum undulatum) seedlings and many mature plants of Bluebell Creeper (Sollya heterophylla). This attractive climber looks deceptively indigenous, resembling a somewhat robust Climbing Appleberry (Billardiera scandens). It is however, a native of W.A and a garden escape. It has delicate blue flowers in autumn, and at this time of the year, juicy berries.

All information on weed removal by FOWSPS is being carefully recorded, so that we can return to specific sites at a later date to monitor our success.

Letter to the Editor.

V.N.P.A. VIEWS NATIONAL PARKS TO BENDIGO

The restructure of the Department of Conservation and Environment continues apace with further announcements on July 16. Key statewide programs and their respective interim general managers are allocated to the following divisions.

North-west Ken King

National Parks & Public Land

Tourism, Education & Information.

North-east Don Saunders

Land Protection, Flora and Fauna

South-west Diana Paterson Fisheries

Port Phillip Peter Sheehan Water, Fire management Richard Rawson Forests Ginnsland

Head Office Mark Stone Research Wayne Chamley

The rationale for statewide programming allocations includes

the following statements.

North-west includes "National Parks with significant management issues". North-east has flora and fauna issues that are present in a wide range of habitats encompassing forests, parks and public and private land." These are statewide issues not peculiar to any one division. Indeed flora and fauna in the north-east could hardly be further from forestry issues, for which the division has an important role, particularly controversial rainforest issues in the Otways, Gippsland and the Central Highlands.

VNPA has joined with other conservation groups and the Victorian Public Service Association to oppose the restructure. We have done this through formal channels of communication with the department - meetings with the Minister and his advisor, the acting Director-General and regional managers. We have attempted to highlight problems with the proposed restructure through the media and to that end we have had coverage on radio, television and through metropolitan and rural newspapers. Many people have contacted VNPA as a result of this activity and there is an enormous level of concern being

VNPA believes the restructure should not proceed. DCE has been tampered with enough over recent years. In summary our opposition to the restructure is:

We see no logic in breaking up statewide facilities of a department as integrated as DCE by sending divisions to

Stage 2 of the restructure should be given an opportunity to work and this will be achieved by keeping existing divisions in Melbourne. Melbourne is the communication and geographical centre of Victoria. Communication between divisions and integration of DCE's activities will not be enhanced by the proposal. Indeed it is our view that efficiency will be reduced and costs increased by the proposed restructure.

According to Minister Crabb in a recent meeting the restructure is not costed. We do not agree with his assertion that the actual figure will not be noticeable. What of relocation costs, new buildings, staff movements, on going increases in travel and accommodation costs for people touring the state to make contacts previously efficiently made in Melbourne?


Rather than streamlining management there will be seven entirely new positions (general managers) and two or three new regions.

We are concerned the restructure will lead to a further loss of experienced staff and many staff will clearly have difficulties relocating out of Melbourne.

It is a huge act of faith for us to agree that improved service delivery will occur given our concerns above

We've seen both sides, wild figs, daisies, herbs, nop busnes, fuscias, cattleplants, throughout, They had an odd day of rain recently so many plants have flowers and the rest are seasonal. There is a seige mentality about vegetation out here. Get the flowers out quickly and recede to green bush to survive till the next time.

Joc and Suzy have collected limitless beans from the boomerang tree to make a necklace, and are enjoying the freedom places like Warrandvte and here can offer. They've enjoyed playing with the children from the community and have made a couple of friends with whom they've swapped colour pictures.

it's the weekend and the last two nights we've camped out under the stairs. We heard babbiers and butcherbirds at dusk and dawn. Even got to see some. Many other scrub birds but the bitcheroirds have sant melodic choruses whilst the pabblers kept us laughing at their antics. There are falcons, aagles, crows and cockies like we have sparrows in Melbourne. Major Mitchells have been regularly spotted. We've seen a few owls. Actual wild animals have been sparce on the ground, and cattle and horses. This is their and season so much of the wildlife has deserted for the perimeters to get access to more water and feed.

Sunsets and sunrises paint the sky daily and make the sky brilliant reds - salmon pinks oranges contrasting with the blue of the sky and the green of the muiga-

Everywhere we've been loads is being done to try to save N.T. from devastation. Virtually untouched it is worth the battle. The land rights in the N.T. have bought learning and greater co-operation between both sides and much is contained or improving

Up here, 80% of the news is ecology orientated. More 5% goes to education. The rest highlighting ridiculous government situations. There is a feeling of positiveness, missing in Victoria. We all know there are problems but most are being actively minimised. Results are happening, although health is still a major problem.



MONDAY MORNING, LATE JULY 1991

In an early morning swoop your mystery reporter braved shafts of sunshine slicing through the trees, and penetrated to one of the 'centres' of activity in the Warrandyte State Park. In spite of the fact that IAN ROCHE was out opening gates your M.R. persisted with 'phone calls and finally cornered him discussing park matters such as fences, bridges, steps, minor misdemenours, costing rough estimates for works, weeds and so on. Other key words heard in this 'in camera' discussion were 'new tracks', 'heavy poles', 'overviews of the river', 'basis of a landscape plan', 'treated pine', 'wheelchair width', 'barrier fences', 'protection', 'drainage', 'environmentally sensitive', 'the need for a biologist to ' and 'not adding to problems'.

The co-discussers-conspirators were Jeff Carboon, project officer, and Michelle de Leew, planner. Unfortunately due to work pressure lan was unable to be further interviewed that day.

TWO DAYS LATER the interview was re-opened. Present were:

(a) Ian McKenzie Roche - Senior Ranger at W.S.P.

(b) The Mystery Reporter - 'a La Carre'.

lan's ('Mick') first posting was Warrandyte, then Croajingalong Park, then Morwell State Park and now back at Warrandyte. Before all this he worked in the Administrative section at Head Office (the old PARKS SERVICE).

Married to Gail and father of Daniel and Karly, lan's main leisure time interests are boats, motorbikes, (presently a YAMAHA XV 1000) and is acquiring a Ford Maverick - four wheel drive. He enjoys camping, fishing - particularly salt water and maintaining all the equipment in good order.

Born in Pascoe Vale, Melbourne on the 9 July 1957, lan grew up in Macleod, went to Rosanna Primary, MacLeod High and later qualified with a Certificate of Applied Science in Conservation and Resource Management at Creswick. He is currently involved in a Fireline Boss Course at Creswick.


After three years at Warrandyte Ian sees 'changing community attitudes to public Iand'. He sees the Management Plan as one of the major advances on behalf of flora and fauna, and putting it into effect. e.g. dogs, reconstruction of the beach at Norman's Reserve, and redevelopment of beach and carpark at Jumping Creek. "The majority of proposals in the Management Plan are in the process of being carried out. As with all matters money is a bugbear and has required the best use of human resources."

QUESTION (1) Have you been satisfied with the community response to the needs of the Park?

ANSWER (1) "It's a long answer. On specific issues I have been disappointed with the response and on the other issues the community has responded well. The response to new Regulations relating to dogs was, I thought, very selfish, but the response to the activity on revegetation works has been terrific. Committment from the local Primary Schools - Andersons Creek, Warrandyte, Warrandyte South, Eltham Primary, Ringwood Field Naturalists, Friends of Warrandyte State Park, local Street Groups, "Gads Gang", Scouts and Guides, many small groups of volunteers (and of course Rangers and Construction and Maintenance Staff) and others has been enthusiastic. There is lots of scope for developing the activity fo these groups and already has been through the leadership of FOWSP."

QUESTION (2) How do you envisage the Park will look in a few years time?

ANSWER (2) "We will have far fewer degraded areas, the revegetation process, both natural and assisted by volunteers and staff will have had obvious effects. The maze of old vehicle and walking tracks will have been rationalised. Desirable tracks will be maintained to satisfactory standards. Undesirable ones revegetated. Many areas have been identified for development under the Management Plan and hopefully money will be available for ... such sites."



QUESTION (3) What about things like the Interpretation Centre, opening up other sections of the Park for vehicle access, parking, barbecue areas and River frontage activity?

ANSWER (3) "The Management Plan identifies the need to develop new facilities in some locations, e.g. Mount Lofty - when we become the managers of that area we will (funding permitted) develop car parking and picnic facilities - benches, tables, walks and tracks, signposting; access for disabled will be very difficult in that site, - very much a bush type picnic area, toilets. There is a natural billabong system which we hope to restore by moving major visitor facilities to a more appropriate location.

As far as the Interpretation Centre goes I would like to see a jointly-funded office in the Warrandyte Community Centre where the Department of Conservation and the Environment, environmental groups, Doncaster and Templestowe council ... all pay a share in some person's wages and that person act as an 'ambassador' for all those organisations. That office would supply information for tourists and locals in relation to the environment and features of the area, e.g. Pound Bend tunnel. mines, wildflowers, Koalas. Kangaroos, where and when and how to see these things, advise on what local plants are suitable for planting, handle queries on whether or where or what can be done around the Park area - to focus the relevant information in the one place but purely an information activity.

I have a greater vision for an Interpretation Centre. 'THE ISLAND' could be restored to its 'natural' state by weed removal and re-open the original course of the Yarra River so that it becomes truly an island again. Then construct an Interpretive Centre to develop the gold-mining, natural history and environmental themes required for the Warrandyte area. The site is appealing, people would walk over on a bridge, it has many remnants of mining history and is surrounded by the Yarra River. (an appropriate thought in the year of the wetlands - M.R.)

It would be a big job to get the area weed free. If we had the options and the staff we could draw in many groups, in a two way process, contributing and helping the groups as they help the Park. This requires an individual to identify all these resources and tap them."

At this point your ever alert mystery reporter realised that there is a wealth of information and ideas even in the Senior Rangers thinking (he's not just a handsome face!). More about that in the future.

LAST QUESTION Whats the rumour on the M.M.B.W. taking over the Park?

ANSWER "I believe that there is no present intention for any take-overs in relation to Warrandyte State Park".


