Memories of Joan MacMahon from FOWSPians compiled by Linda Rogan.

SO MANY FOWSPians are very saddened by Joan's passing on 15th April 2014 and wish to offer sympathy to her family while remembering happier times and Joan's huge contribution to FOWSP over the years.

I first met Joan in 2008 when she volunteered to assist two relative newcomers, Joan Broadberry and myself with the editing of the FOWSP newsletter. A quick look through some of the old newsletters has made me aware that Joan helped with the newsletter for many prior years in the 1990's and had written many fine articles herself.

In 1990 it was noted that "Joan MacMahon has begun making- carry and shopping bags from used calico flour sacks donated by Peter at the local Health Food Store. (to sell)... at the Market and they will contain a collection of Green — information as well, plus free seed, a plant voucher from FOWSP." Cathy Willis says "she had a very creative and artistic side".

A note in 1992 states "Joan and Ken MacMahon are hard at work with the final editing (of) Discover Warrandyte." Pat Coupar remembers her work in helping to edit Discover Warrandyte "as you can imagine she was meticulous getting all the details right - so important in the final product."

Her name appears as leader of many walks and activities throughout the 1990s. Ben Gotlib's shares his thoughts of one in particular "Joan led a small group on a walk to a sparse hilltop in Warrandyte. Near a flowering golden wattle Joan explained, in less that half an hour, the relationship of the geology, soil type, altitude, local weather and flora and fauna, in the clearest way. I've been on many walks with highly knowledgeable people but this was the most inspiring."

One project that must have been particularly close to her heart was the Norman Reserve fern gully near the end of Bradleys Lane. Notes on a 1997 morning activity tell us, "Once this area was choked by Ivy, Pittosporum and Cotoneaster. After several 'Friends' and Green Task Force working days almost all weeds have been removed."

Josh says "Joan was always full of enthusiasm and new ideas both for FOWSP and the nursery'. Cathy Willis remembers her inquisitive nature, seeking to understand why one species was different from a similar one, or why a seed didn't germinate.

"She was a highly valued committee member, enthusiastic worker and well respected for her ecological insights. Her knowledge and friendship were greatly appreciated by the group, as was her passion for our bushland, both locally and across Australia," Cathy adds.

Margaret Burke wishes to share the following:

Joan joined FOWSP, not long after Margaret & Ian Burke began stewardship. It must be close to 30 years ago. We met when she visited the Market Stall and immediately 'clicked'. The MacMahons joined FOWSP and Joan became a regular

APRIL'S FIRST TAG was to Mt Lofty, with Ranger Cam Beardsell, to do maintenance work on the latest planting there.

About 20 years ago I lived for a year at Bend of Isles, on the other side of the Yarra from Mt Lofty. At that time there was very little vegetation other than grass, which was grazed by agisted horses, which I used to

watch from my veranda. There were [and still are] a couple of sugar gums [*Eucalyptus cladocalyx*] - a South Australian ring-in, and one huge Red box [*E. polyan-themos*] which had grown so much that it was being strangled by its sturdy wire tree-guard. I waded the river

member. In fact so keen about Warrandyte were they, she and Ken, with youngsters Daniel & Rowan actually moved here from Heidelberg, their new home a neighbour of the Park.

From the beginning she was involved, and joined in with true conviction. Joan had a great many practical and intellectual skills. She and Ian Burke enjoyed discussing environmental matters. He wrote the 'Editorial' in the FOWSP Newsletter for years. Joan always had something to say about each edition. She was never afraid to give an opinion. Ian liked and respected her views. She was a woman of passion and commitment.

Joan understood the delicacy and intricacy of the Warrandyte habitat and was a dedicated FOWSPian. To her, Norman's Reserve was an especially valued place. Indeed her home abutted the walking track. At that time, the Park reserves north of the riverbank - were a low priority in the Rangers work schedule. After all they were supposedly in such good order! Joan helped set up a little FOWSP sub group working around 'Antechinus Swamp' and Normans Reserve where volunteers helped her perform 'minor' miracles.

Joan studied horticulture, and later, with her garden management business, was able to influence many locals to manage their gardens as extensions to nearby parkland. She was often employed as a weed contractor with Pat Coupar, under David Van Bockel's guidance.

They did critical weed management for the Osborne Landcare Group, using funding from grants.

Margaret Burke remembers a day when Joan was working with a particularly difficult group of school kids, (some of whom seemingly felt like a press gang who should 'naturally' play up). Without Joan, Marg (would have) felt like calling a halt - but the trouble-makers were attached to either Marg or Joan and all the others soldiered to a very happy conclusion at Wombat Creek. Having lent the group her dressmaking shears to cut shade cloth for the project however, Marg was horrified that they were 'lost'. Joan was even more horrified and helped sift through every bit of the mulch. Alas, the shears were never recovered!

Joan also joined the Landcare members as a volunteer, for Wednesday weeding at WSP's Wombat Gully to help make it the delight it is today.

Margaret says, "When I wander alone along the riverbank or through the many project areas throughout the Park, I know Joan's spirit will be there. Many memories of travail and triumph will walk with me and elicit fond thoughts of my quite unique, precious friend Joan."

Vale dear Joan.

FOWSP would like to remember Joan through a planting day in her honour later in the year, perhaps at Pound Bend.

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Tagging Mount Lofty continued

with wire-cutters and liberated this fine tree. Today it is surrounded by its progeny; and the whole area is now liberally clothed in trees and bushes, both planted and spontaneously emergent.

The planting we worked on with Cam was part of the 'Million Trees' project,' and in spite of the drought, we estimated an 85% success rate to date. Each planting-spot had been treated with herbicide, which helped reduce competition from weeds. Degraded pastures are often difficult sites to re-vegetate because of competition from weeds. Tall tree-guards had kept the plants safe from browsing by the large resident kangaroo population but now it was time for us to remove the guards.

At morning tea, which we enjoyed on top of Mt Lofty [thanks Lindy!] Cam pointed out and named the topographic features stretching from Mt Monda to the distant Lysterfield Hills. He also sketched the history of Mt Lofty, from its ownership by racing-car driver Bob Jane, through its acquisition by the Board of Works for Golf Course in the background at Mt Lofty the never-built Yarra Brae Dam, to its eventual hand-over to Parks TAG Victoria - something the early FOWSP vigorously campaigned for!

This series of educational and interpretive nature walks explores some of Manningham's most inspiring and interesting bushland. Wednesday 7th May On the Trail of Giants - Australia's Largest Trees presented by Brett Mifsud Most of Australia's landscape consists of arid land, on wafer-thin topsoil, baked by searing hot summers. However, in parts of the south-eastern edge of the continent, ample rainfall, fertile soils and a mild climate have allowed the much maligned eucalypt to grow and evolve to become the tallest and largest flowering plant on the planet.

Despite their impressive size, most of these giants remain virtually unknown to the public, even though many are close to Melbourne and Hobart. This presentation will showcase some of our magnificent remaining trees and look at their importance, both ecologically and culturally.

Wednesday 4th June 2014 Mistletoes - indicators of ecosystem health and diversity presented by Anna Burns In this seminar, Anna will describe the diversity and ecological roles of mistletoes in Australia, including their interactions with animals and host plants. Mistletoes provide food and shelter for birds, mammals and invertebrates and contribute to nutrient cycling. These parasitic plants can also be indicators of ecosystem health because over-abundance of mistletoes indicates and imbalance in nature. Anna will present part of her PhD research in this seminar.


