

Affordable Housing for Dunnarts

Any outing with Cam is likely to result in my head spinning from the current of fascinating information and opinion that he so freely and brilliantly shares - a recent TAG at One-Tree Hill was no exception. The task was to build homes for the slender-tailed dunnart [Sminthopsis murina] within an enclosure that excludes deer, macropods, cats and foxes.

Cam showed us how to dig a shallow recess into the rocky clay soil, and line it with lovingly fashioned bedding of coconut fibre and a local wallaby grass. Re-used roofing-tiles were then placed over this cosy nest, and stones, soil and wood-chips added to keep out the rain.

It was hard work, but we were constantly entertained by explanations of the biology of these tiny animals.

Evidently the One-Tree Hill population is a unique outlier of a predominantly dry-country species, which makes its preservation all the more urgent. Apparently their numbers increase in the years after fire - the fire causes grasses to rejuvenate, flower and seed; and fire also causes woody plants to germinate, grow and flower. All of this renewal of the vegetation attracts the insects on which the dunnarts feed; the dunnarts thrive and greatly increase in number. As the plants senesce they become less productive, fewer insects are attracted, and the dunnarts' numbers fall again. For this reason it is important to monitor both the dunnart numbers

Robber Fly Facts By Lynda Chambers

ORDER DIPTERA (meaning two wings); family Asilidae

- Robber flies are also known as assassin flies.
- They are distinguished from other flies by their robust build, the stout pointed rostrum, stiff forwardprojecting setae (hairs) beneath large eyes, bristly hairs on the thorax and limbs and a wingspan between 2 mm to 75 mm.
- Sturdy long legs help to accelerate them into the air to capture prey (flying insects).
- They are aggressive and will attack almost any insect, including those much larger than themselves, e.g. dragonflies mid-flight.

They are natural predators of flies, butterflies, cicadas, wasps and bees. Stiff forwardprojecting hairs be-

tween its eyes and rostrum protect its head and eyes from struggling victims.

- A domed thorax houses their powerful flight muscles.
- They have a piercing rostrum which is plunged into their prey, injecting the victim with a toxic fluid that contains proteolytic enzymes that rapidly liquefy the victim's body tissues ready to drink.
- The male must take care when approaching a female to ensure he is not attacked.
- The larvae are found under leaves, bark or in rotten logs and feed on decaying plant material and the larvae of other insects, including beetle and moth larvae.

and the condition of the vegetation, to schedule a careful burn in order to stimulate rejuvenation of the vegetation.

After a delicious morning-tea, provided by the ever-inventive Lyndy, and the conclusion of our morning's work, Cam took us to the nearby Swedish Mine site.

Here Cam, Bernie and Phil have erected a sturdy fence to protect lyre-birds. Apparently dogs have caused the demise of lyre-bird chicks in the last two breeding-seasons, so Cam & Co have built this high and sturdy fence, which also functions as a safety-barrier around the 19th-century goldworkings.

Not limited to biology alone, Cam vividly described the genesis of the ore-body and the local history of gold-mining. Did I mention that my head was spinning?

Wednesday 3 April Bats - fascinating creatures of the night. Presented by Dr Lindy Lumsden, Arthur Rylah Institute, Principal Research Scientist, Wildlife Ecology Section Leader. Lindy is internationally recognised as an expert on the ecology and conservation of insectivorous bats. In this seminar Lindy will share her extensive knowledge and enthusiasm for microbats, explaining their ecology, habitat requirements and fascinating life history. This seminar will cover local species and what they need to survive. On the night following the seminar we will take a riverside walk with ultrasonic eavesdropping equipment to 'see' how many species can be detected.

If you plan to join the river walk, please bring a torch and wear suitable shoes and clothing for the weather conditions on the night.

No prior experience necessary - There is always someone available to show you the ropes.


NURSERY OPENING HOURS

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FOWSP/Manningham Thursday nature walks



This series of nature walks will explore various sections of the natural areas of Manningham. Each walk is paced to allow participants to enjoy and appreciate the natural beauty of the area.

Bookings are essential as places are limited. Bookings will open two months before the walk date.

The meeting point for each nature walk will be provided at the time of your booking. All walk durations are approximate.

Please wear appropriate clothing for the weather including a hat and sturdy footwear. Bring a water bottle and snack.

Thursday 2 May, 9.30am (note: date change due to Anzac Day) Longridge, Nilja and Seawinds

Enjoy magnificent views, a beautiful section of river rapids and a walk through historic farming properties now regenerating with native plants and habitat for native animals.

Distance: 3.5kms Time: 2.5 hours Rating: Moderate to difficult

Thursday 23 May, 9.30am Candlebark Park to Beasley's Nursery

This walk follows the Yarra River along the flats and ancient flood plains to its confluence with the Mullum Mullum Creek, with the final section traversing Tikalara Park.

Distance: 5kms Time: 3 hours Rating: Easy

Ratings:

Easy – Flat or undulating well formed tracks/paths with low tripping hazards.

Moderate – May include some moderately steep or narrow sections or have higher tripping hazards.

Difficult – Includes steep and/or narrow sections, slippery sections, or high tripping hazards.

Bookings can be made online and are essential as places are limited. Bookings open 2 months before the walk date. www.manningham.vic.gov.au/nature-walks

The meeting place will be provided at the time of booking.

IMMINENT THREAT



to our Green Wedge



Manningham Council wants to amend the Local Planning Policy Framework of Manningham ie. the green wedge

The amendment is labelled C117 and right now, a specific subsection, Clause 21.07 is the most contentious. We are now at the point where the Minister decides between the community (who are supported by the recommendations of the Victorian Planning Panel) and Council.

The Council wants to allow for tourism-related development

This has flow-on implications for the 17 councils in the 12 green wedges that ring Melbourne.

Since the need for the green wedge was first identified in 1971, conditions have changed

Allowing for tourism activities on the scale that seems to be envisaged will put extreme pressure on Manningham's green wedge and do irreversible damage to an already vulnerable environment.

The Panel agree that Manningham's green wedge needs protection

The Panel pointed out that Council's Clause 21.07, which is the main clause pushing for economic/tourist development, 'would encourage economic development at the expense of green wedge values' and will be at odds with 'purposes of the rural conservation zone which are clearly aimed at conservation.'

The Council have voted to reject the Panel's edit of 21.07.

People in Manningham need to write to the Minister of Planning BY THE END OF APRIL The Minister's decision is due May 8th

Expert locals and groups have been part of the process from the beginning. What is needed now is the voice of the community. This means writing about your personal experiences of Manningham's green wedge. Talk about where you live, why you moved here, your observations of nature and your concern to protect it.

Request that the Minister accept the Victorian Planning Panel's C117 recommendations IN FULL.

Dear Minister

Re: Manningham Planning Scheme Amendment C117

We, the Friends of Warrandyte State Park (FOWSP), have been highly successful over the past 35 years at growing and planting hundreds of thousands of indigenous plants in our beloved Park and on private properties in the area.

There are currently 270 nature loving family members plus many additional volunteers during the year who help planting and weeding, educating and raising awareness and strengthening our community.

We are appalled and dismayed at Manningham Council's decision to reject the recommendations of the recent reference panel appointed to review the planned changes in Amendment C117.

Already 82% of our indigenous species in our area are classified as vulnerable, endangered or critically endangered (42%).

This Amendment is another attack at the Green Wedge Regulations and risks the existence of the breathing lungs of Melbourne. The continuous questioning of these regulations needs to be stopped.

We strongly urge you to accept all the recommendations of the Victorian Planning Panel to Manningham Council, and particularly the Panel's advice that the Council should abandon its proposed changes to C117 Clause 21.07.

Thankfully there are many local groups and individuals here repairing our local ecosystem.

It can be rejuvenated but not if we continue to allow the Green Wedge to be further encroached upon.



The males harbour tightly coiled spring-like structures in their pedipalps which are matched by a receiving coil on the female and used for mating.
