

NATIONAL TREE DAY SUNDAY 28 JULY 2019 Lyndy Gilbert

National Tree Day got off to a good start with wonderful weather and meditation exercises with Belinda Christie, who formerly worked in the FOWSP Nursery. Belinda runs Yoga and mindfulness

classes at Blackburn as well as in the wild. She kindly brought Chai, fresh orange juice, strawberries and snow peas to share prior to the meditation. A group of 22 people, including 6 children, participated in the mindfulness which was extraordinary soothing and relaxing. We learned to open our minds and hearts to the earth around us, to celebrate together, to feel the warmth of another person, to breathe together under the trees (left).

Shortly after 10am, additional volunteers arrived to plant trees (right). Some 50 adults and 12 children walked to Endeavour Bank, ten minutes from the nursery, and participated in planting 700 trees and shrubs. After and Belinda explained how to

shrubs. Artur and Belinda explained how to plant - and away people went, enthusiastically digging holes and staking plants (right).

The kangaroos moved off to a safe distance along with the ducks, especially when the children started attacking the thistles; they did a good job of weeding the bank (below).

By lunchtime, the sun had come out which was

a blessing. After sharing fruit, cheese and dips, our participants tucked into the barbecued sausages, salads and drinks, followed by vegan cakes. Thanks to Manningham Council for contributing to this wonderful feast.

Adults and children had a chance to look at a stuffed koala, phascogale and an echidna as

well as collect brochures and purchase plants after the barbecue. Our faithful FOWSP volunteers jumped in to help at the end of the day. In particular thanks to Don and Doug for cooking the sausages; Cathy, Josh, Artur, John, Caitriona, Lisa, Ken, Nikita and Ariana for helping to clean up afterwards.

I think it was one of the best National Tree Day events ever and I am sure the Wilderness Yoga played a big part in this! Participants came up to us to thank us for organising the planting and the food, promising to come back next year with friends to share the experience.

TAGS July and August

Wildcat Gully at Fourth Hill 18 July

A deer-proof fence protects a small hillside orchid rich plot. A range of rare and endangered local species

were planted here as most had been heavily grazed by deer in the surrounding park area.

Species planted included:

Acacia brownii, A. myrtifolia and

the VROT A. Stictophylla,

Chrysocephalum semipapposum, Podolepis jaceoides, Hakea decurrens, Tetratheca ciliata and Olearia ramu-

losa which has become extinct in WSP.

Pterostylis parviflora,
P. pedunculata,
P. nutans,
Glossodia major,
Corunastylis despectans
Caladenia carnea
P. melagramma.

One Tree Hill 25 July

enthralled with his stories based on his half century of knowledge about the One Tree Hill environment and the history of securing ex-Melbourne Water land as part of the park.

All were excited to learn that some new residents had moved into the Dunnart Affordable Housing Estate we helped to build under Cam's guidance, and that the rangers had been able to capture a happy couple of Slender Tailed Dunnarts on video in their nightly activities.

Again, a range of rare local species were planted. These will provide habitat for the Dunnarts and attract pollinating insects. Plants included *Acacia verniciflua* Varnish Wattle and *Grevillea alpina* Mountain or Alpine Grevillea.

Rifle Range 8 August

Rangers Phil & Cam, plus 16 volunteers, braved a cold Thursday morning on the Buttermans Track revegetation site. Part of the Warrandyte Kinglake Nature Conservation Reserve, this is an important part of the wildlife corridor from Kinglake through to One Tree Hill and the Sugarloaf area. Originally Melbourne Water land, it is currently managed by Parks Vic. This project has been ongoing for several years and maintenance of the previous year's work included repairing damage by invading deer which are very active here. A lot of work involved straightening stakes and re-guarding plants, but a very high survival rate of over 90% meant all the hard work in propagating and planting was well worthwhile. Managing browsing pressure from deer is a challenge, but a combination of tall tree guards and a newly constructed round fence exclosure, should protect the tube stock during their vulnerable years. New plantings included the rarer Scent Bark Eucalyptus aromaphloia and Mealy Stringybark Eucalyptus cephalocarpa.

As always we were well fed at morning tea by Lyndy's wonderful spread, welcomed more than usual in the cold weather.

Wednesday 4 September 7:30 pm Ecological costs and benefits of stormwater wetlands

Wetlands are increasingly being constructed around many cities to mitigate the effects of urban stormwater, especially reduced water quality. While the primary purpose of these wetlands is to manage stormwater, they also attract animals whose growth, survival and breeding may be compromised. Alternatively, some wetlands may be important habitats for animals. Ecologist Dr. Rob Hale will present the results of a four year investigation into how urban stormwater treatment wetlands perform as habitats for aquatic animals and highlight how the knowledge generated through this work can help inform future wetland management. Presented by Dr. Rob Hale

No prior experience necessary - There is always someone available to show you the ropes.


NURSERY OPENING HOURS

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FOWSP/Manningham Thursday nature walks

This series of nature walks will explore various sections of the natural areas of Manningham. Each walk is paced to allow participants to enjoy and appreciate the natural beauty of the area.

Bookings are essential as places are limited. Bookings will open two months before the walk date.

The meeting point for each nature walk will be provided at the time of your booking. All walk durations are approximate.

Please wear appropriate clothing for the weather including a hat and sturdy footwear. Bring a water bottle and snack.

<u>9:30 am Thursday 26 September One Tree Hill</u> This is the jewel in the crown of the Warrandyte Kinglake Nature Conservation Link. Explore habitat for many species no longer found further south.

Distance: 8km Time: 4.5 hrs Rating: Difficult

<u>9:30 am Thursday 24 October One Hundred Acres</u>. Enjoy a gentle walk around Manningham Council's biggest and most diverse parcel of bushland. Look out for the resident Powerful Owls while enjoying the late spring wildflowers.

Distance: 2.5 km Time: 2.5 hrs Rating: Easy to Moderate

Ratings:

Easy – Flat or undulating well formed tracks/paths with low tripping hazards.

Moderate – May include some moderately steep or narrow sections or have higher tripping hazards.

Difficult – Includes steep and/or narrow sections, slippery sections, or high tripping hazards.

Bookings can be made online and are essential as places are limited. Bookings open 2 months before the walk date. www.manningham.vic.gov.au/nature-walks

The meeting place will be provided at the time of booking.

Please note that nature walks will be cancelled on a day of Total Fire Ban or extreme weather warning as Parks Victoria will close all local parks.

Ringtail Rescue

It was on a recent, still July evening, I was settling in on the couch with the heater providing warmth, when I became aware of a distant scratching. My first thought was something had come down the flue of the wood heater (unlit). Thankfully the sound came from beyond that space, and I traced it to outside the kitchen window.

I grabbed my phone for its torch, flicked on the outside spotlight, and crept out to see who was there (maybe something raiding the rubbish bins?). But I saw nothing unusual. Listening carefully I realised the noise was coming from the base of a downpipe. We'd had a lot of recent rain, but not for a couple of days - still, it would be cold, wet and slippery down there.

Panic! Think! I ran for the stepladder, then grabbed a coil of soft rope I keep in the car. I knotted the end, then tied additional knots about every half metre to assist with grip. I climbed the ladder to the gutter, measuring the depth of the downpipe with the rope, then cleared the muddy leaves from the intake of the downpipe, shone the torch inside, and dropped the rope down inside to the bottom. I stepped down a couple of rungs and tied off the rope to the ladder, keeping my hand on it to feel any tension. Slowly, very slowly, the scratching started to rise up the downpipe, until finally a little whiskered face with round ears was looking down at me, so close!

Confidently this bedraggled little ringtail possum gripped the edge of the guttering, gave a huge shake, a few steps, another shake, making its way to the other end of the roof, stopping from time to time for another shake.

By the time I had come down from the ladder, the traumatised little creature had leapt into a nearby shrub which didn't support its weight very well, so it came to ground looking for a better option.

My heart was pounding, probably not nearly as much as that of this poor little creature, but he was safe. What an adventure he could relate to his friends, and I to mine!



The City of Whitehorse and Manningham City Council put together a program "Smarter Living Sessions", from March to September 2019.

On 21 August, the guest speaker was Natalie Isaacs. Two men and around 50 women attended the session on 21 August 2019 which was held at Box Hill Town Hall.



She focused on every aspect of how she lived and found ways to reduce rubbish, electricity costs, food and clothing costs, one small step at a time.

After 10 years of hard work, she has influenced 1 million women who are now reducing their carbon footprint. Natalie decided to concentrate on females as research shows that women make 70% of the decisions regarding household expenditure.

Her not for profit organisation has won the People's Choice Award for the work that they do. In 2013, 1millionwomen won the UN Momentum for Change Award.

Here are a few of her gems of wisdom.

Whilst it is hard to change the way we do things, what we do shapes the world.

We have to love the world. Everything we do is connected to the earth.

The fashion industry is one of the worst polluters of the earth.

Less is more, it gives you a sense of freedom.

We can reduce food waste by 80% through using the stuff at the back of the fridge first and then using a list when we go shopping – don't shop on an empty stomach.

Leave over packaged stuff on the shelf – send a message to manufacturers that this is not acceptable.

Take plastic containers to your local butcher, insist they use your containers rather than waste more plastic.

Find retailers that have loose fruit and vegetables and put them in your containers.

Reduce the amount of meat you eat.

Have conversations with your community to raise consciousness about issues such as palm oil, clothing and plastic packaging.

Pure beauty comes from within. It must be about happiness and wellbeing.

A Pier to Pier challenge is coming up from 9th September to 30th September 2019: go plastic free, car free, dairy free or meat free for 21 days.


CPR COURSE SUCCESSFULLY COMPLETED
