

Memories and more from long term members Compiled by Linda Rogan

Irene and Alwynne both began volunteering at the nursery in 1998. They had decided to volunteer in Warrandyte as an alternative to travelling all the way to Healesville . Alwynne was able to provide transport to Pound Bend. It wasn't long after that they became stalwarts of the plant cuttings table amongst other things. Both mentioned working with Marion, Cathy, Josh and Flora Anderson as well as Pat and Mike Coupar in their early days. Keith and Bev were also active at the time.

Their memories of the rangers of the time, were very positive. Both shared stories of a mystery tour in Yarra Ranges National Park arranged by Parks staff and with Ranger in Charge, Andy Nixon was host and bus driver while Kaye, a staff member then, joined the tour as well. They remembered visiting in O'Shannessy's Weir catchment area for a guided tour and a cuppa and later lunch at the Wild Thyme Café in Warburton. Alwynne particularly remembers ordering calamari and expecting a pile of crisp rings but was floored when the meal arrived with large pieces of squid which nearly filled the plate.

This day had been written up by Pat Coupar in the FOWSP Newsletter for December 2001 under the title of 'Thanks for the Thanks'. The afternoon of that day had included a visit to Healesville Sanctuary with an informative slide talk about the tuan breeding programme and a visit to the mammal breeding area. The whole newsletter makes for interesting reading and features articles by Joan Broadberry, Val Polley and Cathy Willis and JR. It is always interesting to wander through FOWSP's past newsletters. The muttonwood (*Mysine howittiana*) (photo right) a riverside plant, was planted several years ago where rain water occasionally collects in Frogland. They have started growing slowly and are yet to reach maturity and reward us with gorgeous purple berries. However the leaves appear shiny and healthy and I can imagine them joyfully soaking up the moisture. There are currently a large number of seedlings being pricked out into pots so they should be available later in the nursery. (See p. 5)

FOWSP's rainy morning 23 March

In Frogland, the top pond was full and overflowing into the larger bottom pond (or now ephemeral wetland) (Photo left and back page).







The lower pond/tub was well topped up by the rain (photo above) and the *Bolboschoenus* or marsh clubsedge aka as river bamboo, was standing tall. Despite the name, it is indigenous and widespread in Victoria and not the problem of 'real' bamboos.

The cool weather accompanying the rain meant that the remaining native bees gathering in Frogland was smaller and those remaining were very torpid. I will watch to see if any remain into April.

The Joy of Weeding

Our TAG program for late summer and autumn is usually focused on weeding for the obvious reason the dry weather is less amenable to planting. Doesn't seem exciting, nevertheless, the TAGgers engage the task with gusto, especially with the promise of Lyndy's morning tea at the end!

Since the last newsletter, we have completed weeding and plant maintenance on the Mullum Link Trail at Craigs/Becketts Road, Rifle Range on Butterman's Track, and Gallatlys Lane on Pound Bend.

In particular, the steady growth of plantings for over a decade at Rifle Range gives us all heart that re-

storing this corridor is contributing to wildlife transfer between the Warrandyte-Kinglake Nature Conservation Reserve and Kinglake National Park. Cam Beardsall's strategy of planting within the bracken ferns has proved successful in promoting growth and discouraging deer and macropod grazing and damage evident with other plantings.

In addition, we had two ranger-led TAGs. Cam's continuing program at Pauline Toner Reserve in Eltham had us planting 50 more Sweet Bursaria (*Bursaria spinosa*) to extend the area that has seen the successful expansion of sightings of

Eltham Copper Butterfly (*Paralucia pyrodiscus lucida*) grubs. This planting was preceded by clearing of *Cassinia*




No prior experience necessary -There is always someone available to show you the ropes.

longifolia and *Dodonaea viscosa* to open up the area and promote butterfly habitat. The butterfly grub numbers were down to the tens during the millennium drought, they are now consistently above 600 and increasing. The cooler weather discouraged activity amongst the Eltham Copper Butterflies on that day but sharp-eyed TAGgers spotted a Shouldered Brown Butterfly (*Heteronympha penelope*), a Marbled or Klug's Xenica (*Geitoneura klugi*), and a number of Varied Dusky Blue butterflies (*Candalides hyacinthina*).

Phil also led us to Hochkins Ridge Flora Reserve in

Croydon North to attack woody weeds, especially Pittosporum and invasive wattles. Don V.

A plethora of water-loving plants at the nursery



Happily growing (and ready for sale) in our water table in early autumn are many thriving plants. The nardoo *Marsilea* sp. are nearly jumping out of their tubes, in search of a new home (photo left).



My eye was caught by a succulent plant with scaevola–like blooms with the tag *Selliera radicans* (photo above and inset). Vicflora tells me this is now *Goodenia radicans* with a common name of shiny swamp-mat. Apparently it may be placed in a pond or planted in the ground but it will die down if in the ground unless kept wet. However it may return with the next rain. Another waterloving relative but delicate appearing is *Goodenia humilis*. The

photos of blooms above is of mine which I grow sitting in a tray of water amongst *Desmodium* in my fernery. This and many other plants are currently available at the nursery. Linda Rogan

In the nursery on a rainy Thursday

The muttonwood was looking great in Frogland but the young plants meant for orders had been devastated by rodents recently Fortunately Josh was able to find a ready source of seedlings before travelling overseas. Mature plants had dropped their seed in abundance. Jan and other volunteers were able to prick out about 250 plants into tubes which we hope will more than fill the demand.

Joy was busy pricking out the rather tiny *Al-locasuarina littoralis* seedlings which may grow to 8 metres but are just starting to show the segments on the needle-like leaves at this stage.

Thirdly, Marion T. was patiently pricking out the ever popular *Rhytidosperma* or wallabygrass.

From travelling FOWSPians

Parker River near Cape Otway lighthouse. A beautiful inlet below a small shady Parks Vic basic (car and tent) campground at Parker Hill. On the right the rockpools at Crayfish Bay looking towards Cape Otway.



One more trip to the Mt Buffalo National Park at the lovely **Lake Catani** (phto below) in amongst the snow gums. The plateau is still recovering from up to three fires in some areas over the last two decades, with Snow Gums (E. pauciflora) regrowing slowly from lignotubers and dead Alpine Ash (*E. delegatensis*) being replaced by seed germination.

A highlight was to see a number of Flame Robins





(Petroica phoenicea) with their stunning and almost

iridescent flame orange breast colour, contrasting with the dead snow gum branches or dark granite boulders on which they perched. Unfortunately an iPhone cannot capture this beauty but Don did manage this shot of Australian Pipit (*Anthus australis*) on dead and re-emerging snow gum (above right). A further trip to the **Howqua valley and up to Eagles Peaks** (elev. 1407m) revealed some fantastic alpine views and wildlife.
