

Jezebels star in September at Pound Bend





Joy Hicks caught Linda in action photographing the imperial jezebel *Delias harpalyce*. The resulting phone photo, above, shows the first one to emerge on 7 September and below a photo from 14 September.

The exciting news came from Ranger Phil, 'Butterflies are emerging near the ranger's office'. I rushed over to the pendulous mistletoe which hangs into the *Rhagodia* saltbush and at first could only see

shiny Darth Vader-like pupil cases on silken sheets in a few patches. The thrill came on spotting one freshly emerged butterfly shown above. The following week even more had appeared. Photo right show three of the five which I saw on 14 September. As far as I can tell, this emerging occurred over about 10 to 12 days this September as only the empty pupal cases remained on 19 September.

A few interesting facts were found in the Michael Braby 2018 book *Butterflies or Australia*:

- After emerging and pumping up their wings, the butterflies take a couple of days to 'harden' their wings before flight..
- There are usually two generations per year with summer pupae being in smaller groups and lighter colour.
- Larvae emerge simultaneously.
- They graze gregariously and early instars strengthen the base of the leaf with silk to prevent it becoming detached from the stem.

The mistletoe is an *Amyema* species also known as box mistletoe, an epiphytic hemiparasitic plant of the family Loranthaceae, found attached to red box near the rangers office. Gray wrote about this mistletoe in June 2022.



TAGers spring into action.

It has been a busy time for TAGers, contending with a lot of new growth apparent in the park (both indigenous vegetation and weeds). Something the group attends to with gusto!

Fiddler Fence (Fourth Hill, Warrandyte) TAG (31 August) was led by Phil, revealing a lush growth, including our previous plantings of woolly wattle (*Acacia lanigera*), Juniper Wattle (*A. ulicifolia*) and (*Olearia* ramulosa) as well as mass seeding of other species initiated from a planned burn 3 years ago. This time TAGers planted *Viola betonicifolia, Epacris impressa, Pimelea curviflora, Geranium retrorsum* and *Platylobium obtusangulum* as well as tackling ongoing removal of woody weeds, sweet vernal and panic veldt grass.

Phil also led us to Craspedia Fence (also Fourth Hill) (7 September) for weeding around billy buttons (*Craspedia variabilis*) to open up soil for natural regeneration and reduce slug habitat. Flowering in the enclosure were musk daisy bush (*Olearia argophylla*) and button everlasting (*Corinidium scorpioides*).

Gray enthusiastically led us to a familiar haunt, Nilja or Longridge Farm (or as the sign now says Longridge Camp) (14 September) for our usual sortie. against the escapees from the old homestead site agapanthus and an assortment of freesias and other invasive bulbs.

Flora Crescent (St Andrews) was a new site and educational experience for TAGers on 21 September. Phil explained this 1.5 ha enclosure was set up to protect rare and threatened species including a diversity of orchids. Parks Vic collaborated with Wurundjeri for an environmental and cultural burn about 3 years ago, which brought out a number of orchid species including large tongue orchid (*Cryptostylis subulata*). The wine-lipped spider-orchid (*Caladenia oenochila*) is found nearby.

A highlight of the day was meeting up with Cam Beardsell at Boomers Reserve, where he showed us the magnificent growth in an early enclosure from a 2016 burn had promoted significant regeneration including a brilliant growth of peas, both showy parrot-pea (*Dillwynia sericea*) and golden bush-pea

(*Pultenea gunnii*). The woodland plume-orchid (*Pterostylis plumosa*) was in flower and Cam treated us to a demonstration of their manual pollination, unfortunately required as a result of their natural pollinator wasp recently going extinct.

No prior experience necessary -There is always someone available to show you the ropes.


NURSERY OPENING HOURS

Visit from Entomological Society of Victoria (EntSocVic) Linda Rogan

On Saturday 16 September, about 20 members of the EntSocVic spent the afternoon exploring invertebrate life in the picnic area near the tunnel at Pound Bend (photo back cover). In the evening, we

moved down to the folly area where four lightsheets were set up to attract insects.

The day had been warm for September and many





small spiders and insects were seen on tree trunks and young acacia. This included this rusty coloured carb spider (*Isala rufiventris* above, left). I was excited to see the tiny first instars of the imperial blue butterfly (*Jalmenus evagoras*) when I enlarged my photos taken of ants on the young acacia trees.

Attendees were pleased to be able to photograph some of the imperial jezebel butterflies *Delias harpalyce* (p.2) and fortunate as the butterflies had all flown within 12 days of first sighting.

Some of my favourite moths on the light sheets were snout moths from three different families. (<u>Sandava xylistis</u>) is a richly patterned snout moth Family Erebidae (above right); A much larger one, a gum snout moth from Lasiocampidae family was (<u>Entometa fervens</u>) John Eichler's photo below left; third was a small but nicely marked snout moth from the Pyralidae family, (<u>Anemosa exanthes</u>) (below





A visit to Saint Helena Bushland Reserve (SHBR) Linda Rogan

I have volunteered monthly as a weeder/planter etc. in SHBR near my Greensborough home since the 1990's. It is a special pleasure in spring. This year ,on 24 September, although many plants were drying almost to the usual level of early summer, I was pleased to photograph a number of plants in bloom.

First, left, the pink bells (*Tetratheca ciliata*) were blooming brightly. In the 1990s, just one plant was found in SHBR. Before covid we were able to

plant several additional plants, near the remnant. It was pleasing to see most have survived and several were blooming. Chocolate lilies (right) were struggling to bloom, many dry-

ing out early but the colourful wallflower donkey orchid (*Diuris orientis*) was seen in scattered numbers.

September in Wedderburn Joy HIcks

Barrie and Joy's conservation block in Wedderburn, which backs onto a Reference Area, is awash with wild flowers during September. The block was formerly part of the Wychitella Forest.

In late winter and early spring, the rosy baeckea (*Euromyrtus ramosissima*) provides a showy display on the metamorphic slopes (photos right).

Over the weekend I was intrigued to watch two weebills building their suspended nest, over the country roadside and only 1.5m off the ground. Both birds arrived in quick succession, with a beak full of white sticky spiderweb material to line their nest.

The nest is well camouflaged among the eucalyptus leaves, in the middle of the

photo (below left). One of the weebills can just be seen in the inset in the lower section of the photo.
