

There is also an article on eagles and kites, p.6, triggered by Bagel, the baby eagle, in Lynda's garden recently.



Container Deposit Scheme and FOWSP

Last year Victoria became the second last state or territory to have a container deposit scheme - only Tasmania is yet to follow.

South Australia led in 1977 followed by the NT in 2012, NSW in 2017 (in spite of well-funded opposition from a certain multinational corporation) and then WA in 2020.

To be quite fair to Victoria, it did have the Cash for Cans scheme in the 1980s.

So now, you will have paid a deposit on eligible containers but you can get it back! To do so, you need to go to what is known as a "Reverse Vending Machine", feed in your containers and get a payout on those cans and bottles.

Rather than pocketing it, though, you can donate the money to FOWSP. Here's how.

We are now registered as a recipient of container refunds (thank you Lynda and Artur); and thanks to help from Jason, we have been issued with a barcode to "show" to the Reverse Vending Machine, so that FOWSP receives the refund from the containers you feed into the machine.

The nearest Reverse Vending Machine is at the northern entrance to The Pines Shopping Centre (which is the Coles end).

So here is what you do if you would like to take part:

- 1. Collect eligible containers (aluminium drink cans, plastic and glass drink bottles) and take them to the Reverse Vending Machine.
- 2. Wake the machine up by feeding it a container, then hold the barcode (illustrated below) up to the machine's "eye". The machine will respond with "Welcome Friends of Warrandyte State Park Inc." on its screen. The barcode can be on your phone or you can cut out the one printed below.
- 3. Feed in your containers. The refund will then automatically go to FOW-SP's bank account.
- 4. I am happy to send you the barcode via an SMS so you can store it on your phone. My details are on the last page of the newsletter.

I hope you find this fundraising game as much fun as I do!

Around The Traps


Birthday Thursday

Recipe of the month

Savoury bread baskets.

Sliced bread* (don't bother to remove the crusts).

Olive oil, melted butter or margarine.

Use a 6cm cutter to cut rounds from the sliced bread. It should produce 2 rounds from each slice.

Roll the rounds flat with the rolling pin. A 3 x 3 set up does 9 at a time.

Brush each round with olive oil, butter or margarine.

Shape and press gently into small muffin tins – 12 hole tins.

Bake at 180C for approximately 12 minutes.

Let cool.

The remaining crusts and bread can be made into breadcrumbs, bread pudding or frozen until needed.

Enjoy exploring different fillings.

Australian Eagles and Kites



This is Bagel, a juvenile Wedge-tailed Eagle (Aquila audax), who has recently been hanging out at Lynda's property. He'll be slightly smaller than a fully mature adult and has a pale crown. Adults go darker as they age.

There are 3 Australian Eagles; Wedgetail, White-bellied Sea Eagle (Haliaeetus leucogaster) and Little Eagle (Hieraaetus morphnoides). They are widely distributed, although the sea eagle is essentially, but not exclusively, a coastal species.

There are also 4 kites if you exclude the Black-shouldered and Letter-winged kites, as I do, because they are nearer falcons or kestrels than kites.

So, what is the difference between a kite and an eagle? Nothing really. As I've talked about before, most bird genera are derived from old world species and named accordingly. European eagles soar and take larger prey, kites are generally smaller and are more known for their scavenging habits than hunting prowess. That difference is fairly arbitrary though, as both genera take live prey and scavenge when they can.

Here in Australia, two of our kites are also seen in South East Asia. The Brahminy Kite (Haliastur indus) and Black Kite (Milvus migrans) are extensively distributed to our north and west. The Whistling Kite (Haliaster sphenerus) is also found in PNG and Pacific Islands but the Square-tailed Kite (Lophoictinia isura) is endemic and sparsely located throughout the mainland.

No prior experience necessary -There is always someone available to show you the ropes.


NURSERY OPENING HOURS
